VIP PROFILE: Mia Roseberry, Steve Roseberry and Robert Gough

<u>Wounded Warrior Homes, Inc.</u> (WWH) was co-founded by Mia and Steve Roseberry. Mia serves as Executive Director and is a non-voting member of the Board of Directors. Steve is an active member of the Board of Directors. Mia and Steve have served in these roles since WWH was founded in 2009.

Mia has a background in Special Education with emphasis in Moderate to Severe Disabilities. Additionally, she has further education and certificates in non-profit management and planned giving, interpersonal communications for fund-raising and developing major gifts. Mia is also co-owner of a house inspection service with her husband, Steve.

Wounded Warriors Homes is active in the community as a member of the San Diego Veterans Coalition, Oceanside Chamber of Commerce, Vista Chamber of Commerce, and the Carlsbad Chamber of Commerce. Mia is a past board member for the North San Diego Real Estate Investors Group. She is a 4th generation descendant of U.S. Marines. Mia worked as an Emergency Medical Technician and retired after years as a special education teacher.

The survivor of a horrific childhood automobile accident that left her with permanent hearing loss, Mia understands first-hand about the effects of mild Traumatic Brain Injury and the effort that it takes to return to a normal life.



Steve co-founded WWH because he shares Mia's passion for supporting the military community. He has 20+ years of expertise as a licensed residential contractor and home inspector. He's a Certified California Real Estate Inspection Association (CREIA) Inspector, the highest certification in the home inspection industry, and is a member of CREIA (past-president of the North San Diego/Temecula chapter), the North San Diego Real Estate Investors Association, and the San Diego Creative Investors Association.

A Del Mar native, Steve is an active community volunteer whose activities outside of Wounded Warrior Homes include the Susan G. Komen Breast Cancer 3-Day (volunteer for the past five years), Vallecitos Spurs Gymkhana Club (snack shack manager for 11 years), and Teddy Bear House (project manager of the revitalization project).

We became acquainted with WWH through Robert 'Bob' Gough, President of the WWH Board of Trustees. Lisa Stout of <u>The San Marcos Promise</u>, told me that I should attend a Ribbon-Cutting Ceremony for the renovated Veterans Center at Cal State University San Marcos on October 10, 2019. I had read about the good work that WWH was doing for our veterans. Bob was wearing a WWH name tag, so I approached him and introduced myself. We started talking about how we could work together to help our veterans. The plan came together, and Bob worked to make it happen.

Bob is a self-employed architect with a professional background in residential projects, local planning, zonal laws and building ordinances, as well as design and construction. He has also founded companies in graphic design and advertising communications. Before joining the board of WWH, Bob provided the architectural design that connected the Harvest House (addition) to the existing WWH residence on York Drive in Vista. He has also volunteered with several other non-profit organizations in the San Diego.

CONSTRUCTION UPDATE

On February 24, Melvin Hardy and Jennifer Ruder, our Interior Design team from Palomar Cottage, visited SMHS to see our cottages and the space they had to work with as Designers.



During a Saturday work session on March 7, Rick Hoehn and Rick Millwee, owner of RM Plumbing Inc., started installing the Drain-Waste-Vent (DWV) system for our cottage for <u>Wounded Warrior Homes</u>. Rick and Rick taught Students Ronan Nayak and Carston Wellong how it is done so that they could lead other students in the installation of the DWV plumbing on our second cottage.



We knew that our productivity would be slowed occasionally by rainy days. In March, we were impacted by atmospheric rivers sweeping through San Diego County. But, Chris Geldert was prepared with tarps and floor fans blowing in each cottage to keep our students dry. Our friends in Colorado Springs have to contend with snow flurries and drifts. We are lucky to be building in Southern California!

We have undertaken a difficult project, doing something that we have never done before, learning and adapting along the way. We had a plan, and were executing as well as could be expected, given the challenges and hurdles we have had to overcome. We expected to be slowed down by rainy days.





But, we didn't plan for the Coronavirus. As Helmuth von Moltke the Elder, Chief of Staff of the Prussian army before World War I, said, "*No battle plan survives contact with the enemy*." What did our veterans do when they faced a challenge? They stood their ground, they improvised, and they persevered. We will figure out how to maintain our progress until COVID-19 is vanquished. Our veterans deserve nothing less. Toby Keith's '<u>American Soldier</u>' says it best!

PARTNERS: Wounded Warrior Homes, Inc.

It is official: we will be installing our first Warrior Village Project cottage at a <u>Wounded Warrior</u> <u>Homes, Inc.</u> residence in the unincorporated area of Vista, enabling Wounded Warrior Homes to provide services to more Veterans.

Wounded Warrior Homes was founded in 2009 by Steve and Mia Roseberry, after being challenged as entrepreneurs to give back to their community. They were already giving back in many smaller ways and decided to go bigger! They were aware of the challenges facing many post 9/11 Veterans in transition with the "invisible wounds of war". Due to their "invisible" injuries, Vets were unable to land a job and were effectively homeless. So Steve and Mia offered to let some of them stay in their home temporarily. In talking with them, the Roseberry's learned of the challenges these Marines were facing caused by Post Traumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD) and/or Traumatic Brian Injury (TBI). Mia and Steve decided to do something about it, and founded Wounded Warrior Homes, Inc. (WWH).

The mission of WWH is to provide affordable transitional housing and a program of resources that allows these Veterans a path from active duty to civilian life. Sounds simple. Key to the mission is securing housing, and to that end WWH has opened three private residences with safe, private rooms for thirteen resident Vets who share cooking, living, bath and dining areas. The program is on a month-to-month basis. The Vets are committed to being free from addictions. WWH is one of the only programs in San Diego County that has a drug-free and alcohol-free program that also supports Veterans no matter what their separation status, on a case-by-case basis.

The Vet must be committed to do the hard work of preparing a personalized life plan, all under the guidance of a case manager. Together, they work through all aspects of transitioning to civilian life, including independent living skills, financial planning, education opportunities and/or career guidance, VA benefits, and more. All this is offered at low to no charge until the Vet secures benefits or employment. At that time, he pays what he can afford. Most residents do not require two years that the program offers, and as they near becoming ready to depart, WWH helps with housing searches, regular follow up on how they are doing, and more. Additionally, Wounded Warrior Homes' food pantry is open to Veterans and their families who require financial assistance. Many, including our resident Vets, require service dogs, so WWH works with Helen Woodward's Animeals program to help supply healthy dog food for their dogs.

The board of directors is small but highly qualified and dedicated to the mission. Three board members are professionals in the area of brain injury and PTSD. Two of them are Vets. Another is a licensed clinical psychologist, and two others are licensed professionals in the building trade. The staff is equally small, dedicated and qualified, with Veterans and Veteran spouses managing the houses, keeping track of the financials, working daily with our residents, organizing fund-raising events, and so much more.

The need is great in San Diego for transitional housing for Veterans with "invisible" wounds. Imagine if you were injured and returning home from overseas after protecting the freedoms of those at home, only to be confronted with living independently in an unfamiliar civilian world. You might end up homeless! The Vision of Wounded Warrior Homes is to provide a compassionate transition experience into a successful life for Veterans after their military service. *"Having a place to call home while you transition from green to grey is one of, if not the most important, assets to the service member…providing them with occupational therapy and job specific skills is how we take (returning) soldiers and give them the tools needed for a bright future." - Chase Weston, Spec 4, US Army, Ret.*

We can provide <u>truly affordable</u>, permanent housing. But, we can't do it for free. To succeed, we need financial support. The materials required to build our cottages cost about \$25,000 per cottage. The cost of installing a cottage as an Accessory Dwelling Unit will depend on the home site. But, it should cost about \$25,000 per cottage. Hence, we can provide permanent housing for a veteran or a couple for about \$50,000. This is a bargain compared to the cost of other 'affordable' housing projects. "In 2016, it cost an average of \$425,000 to build one unit of affordable housing in California, according to the Terner Center" (*Los Angeles Times, April 16, 2018*).
