# VIP PROFILE: Matt C.



Matt C.: A Story of Endurance

In support of <u>Wounded Warrior Homes</u>, we are bringing you the story of Matt C. Matt joined the Army right after 9/11 and served for almost 12 years, reaching the rank of Staff Sergeant. During his first two tours, Matt trained and served as a fire direction specialist in the artillery. His last three and a half years were spent as a 'Human Intelligence Collector' (Interrogator). After multiple combat deployments, which included Iraq and Afghanistan, he left the military with an almost 100% disability rating, suffering from Traumatic Brain Injury, PTSD, severe depression and anxiety. After trying to make it on his own for several years, he ended up at the <u>Aspire Center</u>, the VA's residential program in San Diego. The <u>Aspire Center</u> promotes recovery in service members, particularly those returning from the wars in Iraq and Afghanistan. After discharge, Matt was homeless and living in his truck when he came to <u>Wounded Warrior Homes</u>.

Matt stayed two years in Wounded Warrior Homes' transitional housing program, concentrating on his physical and mental issues with treatment and therapy. Although he was unable to go to work or attend school, he dedicated himself to getting better a day at a time while chipping away at his other issues, which included establishing financial stability, regaining his driver's license and reestablishing a relationship with his kids. He recently graduated from our program and moved to Long Beach where he is living independently.

Looking back on his two years in the program, Matt admits "Without Wounded Warrior Homes I don't know where I would be." He goes on to say, "The staff and owners are absolutely amazing! They go above and beyond to support their veterans. Thank you Wounded Warrior Homes for helping me turn my life around".

# SCHOOL UPDATE Montecito High School, Ramona, CA

In last month's newsletter we introduced you to Montecito High School (MHS), its awesome Construction Program, and Nick Jordan, the amazing teacher that makes it all happen. We also told you about Montecito's enviable record in SkillsUSA Competitions. The results from this year's 2021 SkillsUSA Region 6 Conference are in. Once again, Montecito students walked away with more than their fair share of metal, as in Gold, Silver and Bronze medals!

Because of COVID-19 restrictions, the SkillsUSA Region 6 Conference was virtual this year. Instead of performing their assignments in person, the competitors did written and verbal presentations of how they would have completed their assignments. Their communication skills were tested as well as their technical skills.

**Francisco Santoyo, Jonathan Liona and Kaleb Koeberlien** competed in Carpentry. **Francisco** brought the Region 6 Gold back to Montecito. **Adrian Garcia** was unable to compete in the 2020 State competition, because it was cancelled due to COVID-19. As a 2020 graduate, Adrian returned this year to win the 2021 Region 6 Gold in Carpentry in the College Division.

Montecito's 2020 Region 6 Gold winning **TeamWorks** team, comprising **Blake Yule**, **Christopher Coleman**, **Luis Lozano** and **Manuel Moreno**, returned to take the Gold in the College Division.

Montecito entered two teams in the High School Division **TeamWorks** competition. The team of **Lanie Rake**, **Lacie Leggit**, **Mark Snow** and **Kylun Webb** brought home the Gold. The team of **Luis Alaniz**, **Oscar Ramirez**, **Ivan Oros** and **Joel Dukes** took the Silver.

**Keynigh Gastelum** competed in **Electrical Construction Wiring** and brought home the Gold Medal. All or our Montecito students have advanced to the SkillsUSA California State Competition in April.



# SCHOOL UPDATE San Marcos High School

<u>San Marcos High School</u> (SMHS) students returned to campus on Tuesday, March 23rd. Students in Cohort A will be on campus on Tuesday/Thursday and students in Cohort B will be on campus on Wednesday/ Friday. Chris Geldert's students will make the most of their abbreviated in-person school year by participating in the <u>Design Build Competition</u> hosted by the <u>Construction Industry Education Foundation</u> (CIEF), and promoted by the <u>Building Industry Association of Southern California</u> and the <u>California Homebuilding Foundation</u> (CHF)

The event was designed to promote career awareness and create a fun learning experience for high school students. Twin Oaks High School (San Marcos) and Montecito High School (Ramona) will also be competing. This is the first year that San Diego county schools have participated in the Competition.

# SCHOOL UPDATE San Marcos High School

The CIEF **Design Build Program** promotes career awareness of the construction industry among high school students. It is an effort to recognize student achievements and affords the construction industry an opportunity to support schools, students, and Career Technical Educational (CTE) programs. The competition provides an opportunity for high school students to gain firsthand knowledge of the construction industry and have hands-on experience in the construction process.


Each team in the **Design and Open Competitions** will be challenged to design and prepare construction documents according to criteria outlined by CIEF and build their structure at their school site or other designated location. Plans will be provided for schools in the **Build Competition**. Participating student teams will be judged on the completion of design, plan review (if applicable), safety and health adherence, and construction phases of a structure.

CIEF has provided all construction materials listed on the materials list, arranged for the delivery of the materials to the school site, and will judge the Competition. Schools competing in the **Open Competition** will be responsible for any additional items they would like to incorporate in their structure beyond the provided materials list. Gift cards to purchase at-home building materials and free online OSHA 10 Training is available for students competing from home. CIEF's mission is to help instructors and students to keep building in whatever manner they can this spring.

San Marcos High School is competing in the **Build Competition**. They will be transforming the materials provided by CIEF into a tool shed for another great SMHS CTE program, the <u>Agriculture Education</u> program, which is training our <u>Future Farmers of America</u>.









#### **CONSTRUCTION UPDATE**

On March 4 and 5, students from Nick Jordan's Montecito High School Construction Program worked on our first cottage which was installed on its foundation in Vista on February 12. They attacked a 'punch list' of items to prepare for the installation of exterior lap siding. They installed steel support straps around the perimeter of the cottage to secure it to the foundation. After a little bit of hands-on instruction from Nick Jordan, the students secured the window frames and caulked the windows.





There was a lot of activity on the building site on March 4 and 5. In addition to the Toros, several volunteer contractors were working. Rick Hoehn and Rick Milwee, owner of RM Plumbing, have been helping us throughout the project, starting with the installation of the interior plumbing with students at San Marcos High School before the cottage was transported to Vista. Rick Millwee installed the connection to the sewer with the help of the Seabees in December. The Ricks came back this month to complete the underground plumbing, and connect the sewer and the water and propane supply lines to the cottage.







Rick Millwee showed the students how to braze copper pipe. He installed a 1" copper standpipe for the fire sprinkler system. Brazing copper pipe is one of the many skills Rick learned on his journey to a very successful career as a plumbing contractor, and a volunteer for the Warrior Village Project.

Rick Hoehn was also a very successful plumbing contractor, who came off of the retirement bench to help our students and veterans. He will be coming back to the site to give our students a 'guided tour' of the plumbing.

### **CONSTRUCTION UPDATE (continued)**

Jon Joseph, Training & Safety Coordinator for <u>Symons Fire Protection</u>, <u>Inc.</u>, was on site on March 5 to tell our students about careers in fire-life safety. Then he supervised the students who installed three fire sprinklers in the cottage. Jon arranged for the Vista Fire Department to inspect our students work on our next work day, but something called 'Finals' interfered with our scheduling.











At times, it got pretty crowded in the cottage. While some students were installing sprinklers, others were busy reinforcing the pony wall between the living room and the bedroom with OSB plywood. At the same time, other students were working on the manhole to the crawl space in the bedroom, and installing blocking and insulation for the shower stall in the bathroom.

Fortunately, there was enough work to do on the outside that the students weren't bumping into each other every time they turned around!

Our Montecito students got a lot of work done in 2 days. We are looking forward to their return!

### **CONSTRUCTION UPDATE (continued)**

Josue Morales, Aaron Poliska and Sal Topete from <u>JAAM Electric</u> came to the site on March 5 to make the connection to the electrical panel and to install the low voltage electrical wiring. They came while our students were on site so that they could explain what they were doing and answer questions. JAAM is one of the many companies that are dedicated to helping our students and our veterans.









On March 5 the Toros demonstrated their championship teamwork skills to unload 150 pieces of <u>HardiePlank® Fiber Cement Lap Siding</u> that was donated by our friends at <u>Weyerhaeuser</u> and transported from San Marcos High School to the building site by our friends at <u>Saroyan Hardwoods of San Marcos</u>.



Montecito High School students will not be able to take any more field trips until further notice. However, we hope that Nick Jordan will be able to return with his students soon to install the siding that they unloaded.

In the meantime, we wish Montecito good luck in the 2021 California State SkillsUSA competition.

I was one of two girls in the BITA class and quickly fell into a team leadership role. My responsibility was to keep everyone on track and project focused. I learned to read blueprints, and help my team understand tasks for the day. I realized the importance of good communication, problem solving, and teamwork.

Without the support of industry, the tiny home project would not have been successful. Many of the volunteers became a mentor to me and guided me through different industry pathways. Before taking BITA, I was on a different career path, but BITA pivoted my vision and for that, I am thankful."



### DONATE TO THE WARRIOR VILLAGE PROJECT

We can provide <u>truly affordable</u>, permanent housing. But, we can't do it for free. To succeed, we need financial support. The materials required to build our cottages cost about \$25,000 per cottage. It will cost about \$10,000 to transport a cottage to its installation site. The cost of installing a cottage as an Accessory Dwelling Unit will depend on the site. But, it should cost about \$30,000 per cottage. Hence, we can provide permanent housing for a veteran for about \$65,000 per unit. This is a bargain compared to the cost of government supported 'affordable' housing projects. According to the <u>Terner Center for Housing Innovation</u> at UC Berkeley, it cost an average of \$480,000 (\$700/sq ft) to build one unit of affordable housing in California under the Low-Income Housing Tax Credit (LIHTC) program.
