PROGRESS REPORT

It has been a challenging 2-1/2 years since we started building two cottages in the inaugural construction class at <u>San Marcos High School</u> (SMHS). Despite the shutdown of the school and the loss of our student builders, material supply chain disruptions and rising costs, we managed to complete our first home (SM #1) and install it as an <u>ADU</u> at <u>Wounded Warrior Homes</u>' residence in Vista. We could not have done it without the support of contractors who donated their expertise, labor and materials to help us complete the cottage, often stepping in to do the work that we had hoped our students would do. With the generous support of our Sponsors, the house is well appointed and much nicer than we had envisioned!

Wounded Warrior Homes is planning a Ribbon Cutting Ceremony for its new ADU in March. In conjunction with the ceremony, Wounded Warrior Homes will be scheduling COVID safe tours of the ADU so that our Sponsors can see the results of their generosity.

Our second cottage (SM #2) is still sitting behind the woodshop at SMHS. Students from the Class of 2020 completed the framing and sheathing of the house before they were sent home on March 13, 2020, never to return. JAAM Electric completed the interior wiring for us before the shutdown. Plumbers Rick Milwee and Rick Hoehn installed the interior plumbing lines with the help of our students just before the shutdown. But, there is much work still to be done to complete our second house.

VIP PROFILE Veterans Served by Homes For Our Troops


In our December 2021 newsletter, we profiled <u>Homes For Our Troops</u> (HFOT), a publicly funded 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization that builds and donates specially adapted custom homes nationwide for severely injured post-9/11 Veterans to enable them to rebuild their lives. HFOT has built 40 homes for veterans in California, including 29 homes in southern California.























SCHOOL UPDATE

Today, Interfaith provides a wide range of social services for homeless individuals, veterans, unemployed, youth and low-income community members. Head-quartered at the Betty and Melvin Cohn Center in Escondido, Interfaith has grown to be the most comprehensive agency in North County, with multiple locations, many open 24 hours a day.

- Housing
 - Rental & Mortgage Assistance: Interfaith's Homeless Prevention program offers emergency rental or mortgage assistance to prevent imminent homelessness.
 - Bridge Housing: Interfaith offers temporary beds for veterans with or without a housing intervention already in place to assist in their transition from homelessness to permanent housing.

DONATE TO THE WARRIOR VILLAGE PROJECT

We can provide <u>truly affordable</u>, permanent housing. But, we can't do it for free. To succeed, we need financial support. The materials required to build our cottages cost about \$25,000 per cottage. It will cost about \$10,000 to transport a cottage to its installation site. The cost of installing a cottage as an Accessory Dwelling Unit will depend on the site. But, it should cost about \$30,000 per cottage. Hence, we can provide permanent housing for a veteran for about \$65,000 per unit. This is a bargain compared to the cost of government supported 'affordable' housing projects. According to the <u>Terner Center for Housing Innovation</u> at UC Berkeley, it cost an average of \$480,000 (\$700/sq ft) to build one unit of affordable housing in California under the Low-Income Housing Tax Credit (LIHTC) program.
