We told you about our collaboration with <u>Palomar College</u> in previous newsletters (<u>February</u>, <u>May</u>, <u>June</u> and <u>July</u> issues of 2020, and the <u>November</u> and <u>December</u> issues of 2021). We have worked with the <u>Architecture</u>, <u>Interior Design</u> and <u>Cabinet and Furniture Technology</u> programs. The Cabinet and Furniture Technology program offers the most comprehensive woodworking career curriculum in the nation.

Palomar College struggled through the pandemic just like we did, and we were not sure if we would be able to continue our collaboration when the pandemic fallout settled. So, I was very happy when Jordan Clarke, Assistant Professor and the head of the Cabinet and Furniture Technology Department, reached out to tell me that Palomar College was looking forward to continuing its support of the Warrior Village Project by building cabinets for our second cottage. Jordan is teaching a Cabinet Design class this semester. He will be teaching a Cabinet Production class in the Spring Semester in which his students will build cabinets for us using the materials that have already been donated by our awesome Sponsors. Our American Veterans

Veterans Day, originally known as Armistice Day, is a federal holiday in the United States observed annually on November 11 to honor military veterans of the <u>United States Armed Forces</u> (who were discharged under conditions other than dishonorable). Veterans Day coincides with other holidays, including <u>Armistice Day</u> and <u>Remembrance Day</u>, which are celebrated in other countries that mark the anniversary of the end of World War I.

Major hostilities of World War I were formally ended at the 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month of 1918 when the Armistice with Germany went into effect. When the armistice was signed, over 20 million people had lost their lives. At the urging of major U.S. veteran organizations, Armistice Day was renamed Veterans Day in 1954.

The <u>Veterans Association of North County</u> (VANC) hosted its annual Veterans Day celebration on November 11 to honor all those who served. Highlights included the VANC Choir, a Marine color guard from Camp Pendleton, Gold Star Wives, Master of Ceremonies Frank Pulley (SgtMaj USMC, Retired), and Navy chaplain Edwin Handle. The keynote speaker was <u>Lt. Gen George W. Smith Jr.</u>, Commanding General, I Marine Expeditionary Force (I MEF), Camp Pendleton. The ceremony was followed by a complimentary lunch.



SCHOOLS Poway High School

We continue to work to build connections between our high schools and the building industry. In our <u>May 2022 Newsletter</u> we told you about the visit of Poway High School (PHS) students to the <u>Associated General Contractors (AGC) Apprenticeship Training Facility in Lakeside</u>. In November Jeremy Martin, Career Education Specialist for the Poway Unified School District, reciprocated by inviting Apprenticeship Instructor Jon Hill to PHS to see the Moveable Tiny Houses PHS students are building and to meet their new Teacher Gene Tallon.



Gene Tallon has been a teacher at Poway High School for many years. Most recently, he taught mathematics. But, prior to teaching math, Gene led Poway High's cabinet making program. So, in addition to his math skills, Gene has hands-on experience working and teaching in a woodshop.

Ellen Stone joined Jon Hill on the visit to Poway High School. Ellen is a busy lady. She is the cofounder of the San Diego Chapter of the <u>American Tiny House Association</u> (ATHA). Ellen is also the founder and Managing Director of <u>Tiny Home Central</u>. Tiny Home Central is a central source for tiny home info in San Diego.

Ellen is also working with <u>Urban Corps San Diego County</u> to teach young adults how to build Moveable Tiny Houses. The mission of Urban Corps of San Diego County is to provide young adults with the tools to expand their career opportunities through education, life skills training and paid work experience on projects that benefit our communities. Urban Corps provides a second chance at a high school education and paid job training designed to encourage civic engagement, responsibility and self-sufficiency.

DONATE TO THE WARRIOR VILLAGE PROJECT

We can provide <u>truly affordable</u>, permanent housing. But, we can't do it for free. To succeed, we need financial support. The materials required to build our cottages cost about \$60,000 per cottage (June 2022 estimate). It will cost about \$10,000 to transport a cottage to its installation site. The cost of installing a cottage as an Accessory Dwelling Unit will depend on the site. But, it should cost about \$30,000 per cottage. Hence, we can provide permanent housing for a veteran for about \$100,000 per unit (\$250/sq ft). This is a bargain compared to the cost of government supported 'affordable' housing projects. According to the <u>Terner Center for Housing Innovation</u> at UC Berkeley, in 2019 it cost an average of \$480,000 (\$700/sq ft) to build one unit of affordable housing in California under the Low-Income Housing Tax Credit (LIHTC) program.
