

PROGRESS REPORT

2024 was a great year for the Warrior Village Project. We have fully recovered from the pandemic and the closing of our schools, and have regained our momentum. This year we:

- expanded from <u>San Marcos High School</u> to <u>San Pasqual High School</u> (Escondido) and <u>Rancho Buena Vista High School</u> (Vista).
- started building 4 <u>Moveable Tiny Houses</u> at San Marcos, San Pasqual and Rancho Buena Vista that will be offered to nonprofits who will deploy them to house homeless veterans.
- held our first <u>Tiny Houses Build Day</u> in partnership with the <u>San Diego County Office of Education</u> and <u>Workforce Connect</u> (WFC), and hosted by the <u>AGC Apprenticeship</u> program. Our BITA partner high schools, <u>Poway</u> and <u>La</u> <u>Jolla</u>, participated with our WVP schools. We expect this to become an annual event.
- learned a lot about building Moveable Tiny Houses that we can apply to future houses.
- continued to expand our network with the education, veterans and non-profit communities.

Our impressive roster of <u>Sponsors</u> has continued to grow. Most of our Sponsors are enthusiastically supporting the expansion of the Warrior Village Project to more schools so that we can build more houses and train more students in the building trades. After all, who wouldn't want to provide affordable, permanent housing for homeless veterans while training the next generation of home builders!

VIP PROFILE Our Students

Partners of the Warrior Village Project teamed up to hold a Career Exploration Day at the AGC Training Center in Lakeside on December 11. The Day was presented by <u>Workforce Connect</u> and <u>Junior</u> <u>Achievement of San Diego</u> in partnership with the <u>Chula Vista Learning Community Charter High</u> <u>School</u> and <u>Associated General Contractors (AGC) Apprenticeship Training</u>, as well as sponsors <u>BIA-San Diego</u>, <u>Plumbing Heating Cooling Contractors San Diego</u>, <u>Helix Electric</u>, <u>Balfour-Beatty</u>, <u>I.E. Pacific</u>, <u>Sierra Pacific West</u>, <u>East County EDC</u>, and <u>Burnham Center for Community Advancement</u>.

Students from <u>Chula Vista Learning Community Charter High School</u> gained real-world experience in construction careers. The 45 students transitioned through a series of hands-on workshops in the stateof-the-art training facility, showcasing a variety of excellent careers available in construction and related industries. Experiences included wood and steel stud framing, electrical wiring, plumbing, heavy equipment simulation, and building concrete forms.



As the national conversation around the cost of college, student debt, and alternative career pathways continues unabated, the local community and industry are stepping up to equip students and underserved populations with knowledge about high-paying career opportunities. Career Exploration Day showcased the fact that construction provides a broad variety of well-paid career opportunities, often including on-the-job paid training.

Every month we report on the activities of our students at Warrior Village Project partner high schools: <u>San Marcos</u>, <u>San Pasqual</u> and <u>Rancho Buena Vista</u>. But, we also engage with construction programs at other high schools throughout the county. We invited our BITA partner schools, <u>Poway High School</u> and <u>La Jolla High School</u>, to participate in our inaugural <u>Tiny Houses Build Day</u>. We were grateful when they agreed and helped make the event a great success.

We have also reported on other San Deigo County high schools who have participated in <u>CIEF's Design</u> <u>Building Competition</u>, including Mira Mesa, West Hills, Idea Center, and The Learning Choice Academy. And, of course, we have reported on the many <u>Skills USA</u> successes of Nicholas Jordan's construction students at <u>Montecito High School</u> in Ramona.



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Rancho Buena Vista High School: Chapter 1

Michael McSweeney, CTE Coordinator for the <u>California Homebuild-</u> ing Foundation (CHF), came to RBV two days in December to help our students finish the framing of their tiny house and erect scaffolding so they could work safely on the upper reaches of the house.

We delivered roofing materials to RBV and SMHS donated by the <u>Unified Steel</u> division of <u>Westlake Royal Roofing Solutions</u> as well doors from <u>Pellco Windows & Doors</u> and <u>T.M. Cobb</u>. We also delivered plywood sheathing to RBV purchased with a grant from <u>Legacy</u> <u>Endowment</u>. We could not build our houses without generous donations from our Sponsors.





PARTNERS California Homebuilding Foundation (CHF)

The <u>Donald Chaiken Building Industry Technology Academy (BITA)</u>, a program of the <u>California Home-</u> <u>building Foundation</u> (CHF), has partnered with the Warrior Village Project (WVP) to inspire high school students and prepare them for successful careers in homebuilding - all while making a meaningful difference in the lives of U.S. Veterans. Partnering San Diego County BITA construction schools include San Marcos, San Pasqual (Escondido) and Rancho Buena Vista (Vista) High Schools.

Through this collaboration, students gain practical construction experience by building <u>Moveable Tiny</u> <u>Houses</u> on their campuses. This hands-on learning is complemented by industry engagement and a strong foundation in homebuilding education. As the nation faces a critical shortage of skilled tradespeople, BITA serves as a modern-day high school shop class, introducing students to a rewarding career path in construction. Beyond learning technical skills, BITA students create homes for unhoused Veterans, combining their education with the fulfillment of giving back to the community.

The California Homebuilding Foundation supports BITA students with curriculum, scholarships, OSHA 10 safety training, work-ready grants, and mentorships, ensuring their career development and success. In San Diego County, the Warrior Village Project and BITA students are making an immediate impact by constructing Tiny Homes for homeless Veterans, showcasing the power of this partnership shaping the next generation of builders and creating brighter futures for students and Veterans alike.

The WVP and CHF have been working together to expand our network of schools in San Diego County since partnering with our first school in 2019. Today, our WVP partner schools are among eight BITA schools in San Diego County (see map on following page). 

RBV students unloading plywood sheathing purchased with Roy Ansell Family Endowment grant.





<u>Unified Steel</u> (a Division of Westlake Royal Roofing Solutions [™]) donated <u>Stone Coated Roofing</u> panels for the first two ouses we built at San Marcos High School (SMHS) and the first two Tiny Houses we are building at SMHS and San Pasqual High School. I asked Tim Brown, Unified's Territory Sales Manager, if he could donate roofing materials for the two more tiny houses we are now building at SMHS and Rancho Buena Vista High School.

Tim and Unified came through for us again! Our houses will have beautiful, durable, long-lasting steel roofs.







The <u>Miter Foundation</u> donated 6 <u>Milgard</u> V250 Style Line® Series vinyl windows for the first two Moveable Tiny Houses we started building in January 2024 at San Marcos High School (SMHS) and San Pasqual High School. Then in September we started building two more tiny houses at SMHS and Rancho Buena Vista High School. We needed two more sets of windows.

I reached out to Tammy Bartlett at Milgard's factory in Temecula to request the donation of 6 more windows. Tammy presented my request to <u>MITER Foundation</u> Outreach Team Members in Temecula. Three weeks later Tammy informed me that the Outreach Team had approved my request.

DONATE TO THE WARRIOR VILLAGE PROJECT

The Warrior Village Project has joined the San Diego Gives 2024 Campaign. It is easy to donate to the Warrior Village Project through the <u>San Diego Gives online platform</u>. Your donation will go to the Warrior Village Project General Fund to purchase materials to build Moveable Tiny Houses in high school construction classes in San Diego County.

The trailer foundation and building materials and consumables required for one Moveable Tiny House (MTH) cost about \$44,000. The curriculum and the inspection and certification package cost about \$6,000.

The cost of installing an MTH as an Accessory Dwelling Unit will depend on the site. But, it should cost about \$20,000 per house. Hence, we can provide a permanent, fully equipped tiny house for a homeless person for about \$70,000 per unit.

According to the <u>Terner Center for</u> <u>Housing Innovation at UC Berkeley</u> (<u>March 2020</u>): "Between 2016 and 2019 the costs to develop a new affordable unit under the Low-Income Housing Tax Credit (LIHTC) program have increased from \$425,000 per unit to more than \$480,000 per unit." "These escalating costs represent a significant challenge to a state struggling with an affordable housing crisis, and erode the impact of the increased public subsidies directed toward building new housing." Isn't it time to build truly affordable housing?
