PROGRESS REPORT

The Construction Industry Education Foundation (CIEF) held its 40th annual Design Build Competition® this year. The Competition promotes career awareness of the built environment among high school students through hands-on experience in the construction process. It provides a first-hand look at future opportunities in the industry. As it recognizes student ingenuity and achievement, the Competition allows the construction industry to support, partner with, and mentor schools, students, and Career Technical Education programs. During the four-month program, each participating team is challenged to design, plan, and construct a small structure that meets a set of criteria established under the advisement of industry professionals.

This year's Southern California Design Build Competition culminated in two days of construction activity at Golden West College in Huntington Beach on April 9 - 10. This year 38 schools competed in Huntington Beach, including five high school teams from San Diego County: San Marcos High School; Rancho Buena Vista High School (Vista); Poway High School; IDEA Center High School (Santee and El Cajon); and San Diego High School. This was Poway's first year in the competition, while the other four San Diego County schools also competed last year.

The teams were judged by industry professionals on the completion of design, construction, code compliance, and safety. CIEF provided all construction materials listed in the Instructor Guide for the Competition. Thirteen schools that wanted to add materials to customize their build were entered into the Open Competition. Recent years have brought a focus on building with a purpose; teams donate their structures to local nonprofits or sell them to fund a worthwhile cause in their community.

On the second day of the Competition, CIEF hosted an Industry Lunch. This networking event brought together professionals from the built environment, along with other community, regional and national sponsors and stakeholders of the Competition, including students, parents, teachers, and counselors. Sponsors awarded scholarships to students for apprenticeships, trade schools, or colleges.

Back on campus, our students installed the entry doors on SM MTH #1 and SM MTH #2 donated by T.M. Cobb through our friends at Pellco Windows & Doors under the direction of Jon Hill from the AGC Apprenticeship Program.


















Our students also continued with the installation of LP Smartside Lap Siding and trim pieces.

San Marcos students continued with the installation of our <u>T.M.</u>
<u>Cobb</u> entry door and <u>LP Smartside Lap Siding</u> trim pieces on SM MTH #2. Then, working in small teams, they proceeded to install lap siding on all sides of the house. Our students really enjoy using using the <u>Quik Drive® Project ProTM Screw Driving Tools</u> and collated Quik Drive® screws donated by <u>Simpson Strong-Tie</u> to install the siding. Using the tools and collated screws makes the work proceed much more quickly and with greater precision.


San Pasqual High School: MTH #1


Last month we shared the news that Brandon Tarrac, the Construction Teacher at San Pasqual High School, had resigned to become a fireman in the City of San Diego. His students and the Warrior Village Project will miss Brandon. His departure may seem like a serious blow to our program, but it is not. This isn't the first setback that we have encountered and had to overcome in the last 5 years.

We lost all of our student builders at San Marcos High School for two years during the pandemic. With the help of individual volunteers, member companies of the <u>Building Industry Association of San Diego</u> and <u>HomeAid® San Diego</u>, the <u>AGC San Diego Chapter</u>, and <u>Navy Seabees</u> we were able to complete the first house we had stated building at SMHS. Eight veterans have lived in this house, and many more will call it home on their path to a better future.

The construction of San Pasqual's Movable Tiny House will be completed at Rancho Buena Vista High School in Vista. Early in May, the house and building materials at San Pasqual will be transported about 16 miles down I-15 and SH-76 to the RBV build site.

The Escondido Union High School District (EUHSD) plans to replace Brandon with a permanent construction teacher in the Fall of 2025. We will seek opportunities to keep EUHSD engaged with the Warrior Village Project family in the hope that San Pasqual will some day resume the construction of Movable Tiny Houses.


DONATE TO THE WARRIOR VILLAGE PROJECT

The Warrior Village Project has joined the San Diego Gives 2024 Campaign. It is easy to donate to the Warrior Village Project through the <u>San Diego Gives online platform</u>. Your donation will go to the Warrior Village Project General Fund to purchase materials to build Moveable Tiny Houses in high school construction classes in San Diego County.

The trailer foundation and building materials and consumables required for one Moveable Tiny House (MTH) cost about \$44,000. The curriculum and the inspection and certification package cost about \$6,000.

The cost of installing an MTH as an Accessory Dwelling Unit will depend on the site. But, it should cost about \$20,000 per house. Hence, we can provide a permanent, fully equipped tiny house for a homeless person for about \$70,000 per unit.

According to the Terner Center for Housing Innovation at UC Berkeley (March 2020): "Between 2016 and 2019 the costs to develop a new affordable unit under the Low-Income Housing Tax Credit (LIHTC) program have increased from \$425,000 per unit to more than \$480,000 per unit." "These escalating costs represent a significant challenge to a state struggling with an affordable housing crisis, and erode the impact of the increased public subsidies directed toward building new housing." Isn't it time to build truly affordable housing?
